Criteria for the Restorative Action Plan (RAP©)

Restorative action plans take a problem-solving approach to discipline, replacing punitive measures with emotional learning opportunities. Restorative action plans incorporate the following three elements:

Agenda

- 1. Restoration, restitution: Explores strategies that encourages offenders to repair the harm they have caused to a victim and/or the community.
- Reintegration: Actions taken to re-connect and re-engage offenders – those whose behavior have damaged or impaired relationships.
- 3. Support and nurturing strategies: Explore actions that help to strengthen connections to supportive persons and communities for the offender.
